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

The **exponential function** *f* with base *b* is defined by $f(x) = b^x$ or $y = b^x$,

where b is a positive constant other than 1 (b > 0 and $b \neq 1$) and x is any real number.

For
$$x > 0$$
 and $b > 0, b \neq 1$,

 $y = \log_b x$ is equivalent to $b^y = x$.

The function $f(x) = \log_b x$ is the **logarithmic function** with base b. The equation of the inverse of an exponential function can be written as the logarithmic function of the same base.


Conversely, the inverse of a logarithmic function is the exponential function of the same base.
